Ngxokolo's pride and creativity is reflected in the intricate pieces he creates for MaXhosa Africa.

Albie Sachs is an activist, writer and former judge on the Constitutional Court of South Africa . He began practicing as an advocate at the age of 21, defending people charged under the racial statutes and security laws of apartheid. He went into exile in England, where he completed a PhD at Sussex University. In 1988, he lost his right arm and his sight in one eye when a bomb was placed in his car by South African security agents in Mozambique. He later served as a member of the Constitutional Committee and the National Executive of the African National Congress until South Africa's first democratic elections in 1994. Sachs is a Board member of the Constitution Hill Trust.



Vanessa September

Producer, The Albie Collection

Vanessa September is the Producer of The Albie Collection. She previously served as CEO of the Constitution Hill Trust where she provided a stable institutional base for the curatorial, creative and archival teams to complete the work of converting the founding documents of South Africa's constitutional democracy into accessible stories, animations, oral histories, timelines and an accessible digital archive. September is also an architect. She has worked in small and large architecture firms and is the principal of her own small practice. Most of her architectural work assists groups and individuals who cannot afford architectural services.

Brent Leggs

Executive Director, African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund

Brent Leggs is the Founding Executive Director of the African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund, the largest preservation campaign in U.S. history on behalf of historic African American places, and a Senior Vice President of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Through the Fund, he leads a national community of leaders, preservationists, and activists to preserve the memory and legacy of Black American identity. Described as the man who "spends time thinking in centuries" by the New Yorker, Mr. Leggs work is rooted in telling the nation's full history and leveraging historic preservation to mitigate the erasure of African American cultural heritage.



Tiffany Tolbert

Senior Director for Preservation, African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund

Tiffany Tolbert is the Senior Director for Preservation of the African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund at the National Trust for Historic Preservation. She leads high-profile national preservation programs and projects, such as the HBCU Cultural Heritage Stewardship Initiative and Preserving Black Churches and develops preservation strategies for national significant sites associated with African American cultural heritage. Her preservation expertise includes providing technical assistance to local organizations, advocacy, strategic and preservation planning, historic designation and rehabilitation.



Vilma Jurkute

Executive Director of Alserkal

Vilma Jurkute is the Executive Director of Alserkal Initiatives, overseeing Alserkal Avenue,
Alserkal Arts Foundation, and Alserkal Advisory.
Her professional and academic experience is centered on placemaking and the development of sustainable, community–centric creative economies with both global and regional impact.
Under her leadership, Alserkal has grown into a socially responsible and forward–thinking cultural enterprise. She continues to advocate for homegrown initiatives emerging from Dubai and the region, especially through her role on the advisory board of the Global Cultural Districts Network (GCDN).
